WASC/ACSI ACCREDITATION

Every three years, accrediting team members from other WASC and ACSI accredited schools visit the accredited campus to follow up on progress to previous recommendations and assess program success and viability. WCS Administrator, Justin Smith submitted documentation ahead of the visit to guide the observation and the visiting team submitted a report with recommendations and commendations following the visit.

For this visit, the WCS administration was excited to add ACSI (Association of Christian Schools International) accreditation to the existing WASC (Western Association

of Schools and Colleges) accreditation. The accreditation team members visited WCS, spoke with the Board, spent time with parents and staff, and visited the classrooms. At the end of the visit, all WCS parents and staff were invited to hear the reading of the visiting team’s findings (excerpts from the report are listed in the graphic at right). The team praised WCS parents, staff, administration, and Board for their efforts.

In May, WCS received a letter from ACSI, and we are pleased to announce that we received a six-year accreditation term with a one-day visit mid-term.






Valedictorian Katie Sakona speaks at graduation

A funny moment:




