



High School Tuition Comparison



Maintenance Connection Employees Give Day

Planning, budgeting for, and building an elementary school is no small feat. Orchestrating the move after the campus is built adds even yet another dynamic to the work.

Woodland Christian School received a huge gift when WCS alums Chris Bucher (9th grade, '85) and Brad Squires (9th grade, '95), co-founders and owners of Maintenance Connection (MC), called Dave Hargadon, WCS Director of Development, to offer their help with the move. Their service is part of their company's model to gather all employees from across the country and abroad to impact a community with tangible service.

Over a two-day period, during one of the hottest periods of summer, 19 MC employees traveled to Woodland to move the contents of 13 classrooms and the library. In addition, MC purchased and built picnic tables for our lunch area and even shoveled bark.




I went to Ensenada, Mexico with Azusa Pacific Mexico Outreach. I went in June, and we stayed for seven days. We did a Vacation Bible School for the neighborhood children, and we did work projects for our partner church located in Ensenada. My favorite memory is of seeing children that I have met during some of my past trips and seeing how much they have grown, physically and spiritually.

This year for my mission trip with BRIGHT Children International, I traveled to Zacapa, Guatemala for one week in August, leading a team of 19 people. The team included speech, music, physical, occupational, and marriage and family therapists; infant development and special education specialists; a social worker; a parent trainer; and four students who hope to pursue careers in the fields represented. We partnered with Hope of Life International to work with orphans and children with special needs. We also worked with seven foster homes, an orphanage, and a nutrition center. While there, we had the opportunity to be the hands of Jesus to provide knowledge and resources of the children's potential and ways to help them reach that potential. The team provided training and encouragement to the foster parents and care providers. The team also provided donations of equipment and resources for those being trained.

For three months this summer, I had the opportunity to lead worship for Next Step Ministries in Fond Blanc, Haiti. I served on a team with four other American staff and two Haitians who helped with translating and construction. We lived at an orphanage/church that housed 54 children. Each week, we led a new church team from the States who came to work with the villagers, attend the local church, help the children get ready in the mornings, and a variety of other things. Our construction focused on adding on to existing church construction and building an inverter house, which would supply the orphanage with electricity 24 hours a day. We also worked on side projects to make the compound safer for everyone to live in. Devotionals were done throughout the day with the visiting teams, and my lead team and I led a worship service each night, focusing on how God turns our hurt into good, with videos of Francis Chan as the speaker. accepted Christ, and many seeds of truth were planted in the community of Fond Blanc. One lesson I learned while living there was that the Church is important. It is important to choose leaders wisely and with prayer, because the congregation will adopt the attitudes and teachings of the pastor. It is important to have the church community around you to help you with accountability, with understanding, with encouragement, and for simply having the community that has the same beliefs as you. It is important to bring friends to church when you are sharing the gospel with them so they can be encouraged and taught as well. I have a newfound appreciation for the church because of this and a new perspective on the influence of leadership. My team and I learned a lot and will continue praying for Haiti. The village is continuing to be reached by a couple of full-time Next Step staff members, and prayers are appreciated for the ministry there.

This past May, I was given the opportunity to travel to Cheongju, South Korea with one of my professors and a few students. On our two-week trip, we came alongside two different organizations to help teach English to the students. During the day, we worked at an elementary school, teaching grades 3 through 6. During the afternoon, we partnered with a welfare center and ran an "English camp" for various grade levels. Both of these activities proved to be challenging because of a dominating

language barrier, but overcoming that has made me better equipped to be a teacher. While on the trip, we were able to be submersed in the culture and experience many different things that we wouldn't normally experience. Overall, this trip was a growing experience, both in my experience as a teacher and in my relationship with God. I learned to trust in Him to provide safety and provisions, as well as how to be more culturally understanding and aware.

Mr. & Mrs. Mark and Heidi Knapp


